



College Credit Plus – Preparation of English Instructors

The Department of English at The Ohio State University is pleased to offer a graduate program for high school teachers who wish to teach College Credit Plus classes in English composition and literature. We have designed a six-course (18-credit) program to prepare participants to teach college-level English classes. We anticipate that most participants will be preparing to teach composition classes, but we are also offering courses in English and American literature for instructors wishing to teach courses in literary history. Teachers wishing to teach composition should take at least nine credits (three classes) in Rhetoric, Composition, and Literacy studies, one of which must be Approaches to Teaching College Writing (English 6781). Teachers wishing to offer literature courses through College Credit Plus should take at least nine credits (three classes) in Literature.
